Rector's Rambling

Welcome to Homecoming Sunday at St. John's! I am so glad that folks are here to

worship and for the fellowship of a good meal following the 10 AM Service.

Recently I have been musing on what the Church (not just St. John's but the larger Church) looks like now that we are about 5 years post—Covid shut downs. What an interesting time that was with closed parishes and reopening restrictions based initially on what we thought might be best practices. The fact that St. John's was the only parish in the city limits to open for a full year continues to confound me, as does that period of time that we were limited back to "9 people plus the priest" for a Service due to a rise in infections in society (but not a St. John's). Having 10 weekend Services so that all who wanted to come to church (3 Saturday evening, 7 on Sunday) is an adventure I hope we never have to repeat.

Since then society has changed. Many people who were locked out in March 2020 never returned to public worship. At first many did this out of an abundance of caution. Unfortunately not coming to church became the habit, a most unfortunate habit. The devil has a way of taking our best of intentions and instill fear to keep us from making the commitment to return to our obligation to worship God every Sunday in His Church. There is nothing the devil wants more than for us to find any reason to keep us from worshipping the living God

and receiving the Blessed Sacrament. This change has been reflected across society with church attendance still struggling to reach pre-pandemic levels.

The good news is that God is not done with us, and not only is He moving hearts to return to Him, and that people are starting to hear and obey, but also new people are coming to know Jesus Christ as Lord. Here at St. John's we are welcoming new people to worship who are exploring, trying to figure out what God might be doing in their lives. Some new folks grew up in the church, or with no church background at all. But God the Holy Ghost is busy moving hearts and minds to learn more about God and His Church. We welcome this movement of the Spirit.

Today for Homecoming we welcome old friends and new, as well as our regular parishioners. Everyone is welcome to join us in this exploration in the Faith that God will change our hearts, and help us to deeper conversion to His Will for us as members of the Church!

We would be very pleased if you plan to return to St. John's on a regular basis, to **WORSHIP** as part of our parish family. Please complete a Visitor's Form located in the Order of Service and place it in the collection plate or give it to an usher.

Thank you for coming! We look forward to greeting you following the service today and hope to chat with you during our time of fellowship in the undercroft.

Communion Procedure

The Episcopal House of Bishops, in a 1979 teaching, lays out the following guideline for non-Episcopalians to receive communion in an Episcopal Church: The persons should 1) have been Baptized with water in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, 2) believe Christ is present in the sacrament, 3) have been admitted to Holy Communion in their own denomination, and 4) are attempting, by God's grace, to live in love and charity with their neighbor. If you have any questions, please speak to the priest.

To receive the Host, raise your crossed hands, right palm over left. You may also receive directly on the tongue. If you do not wish to receive the Cup, cross your arms over your chest and wait for the chalice bearer to pass by.

If you are not receiving communion, you still may come forward to the rail, cross your arms over your chest, and receive a blessing.

If you are physically unable to approach the rail, please inform an usher and the Sacrament will be brought to you.

Pastoral Care

Please inform the clergy if you or a family member are ill, hospitalized, or unable to attend the regular worship of the Church so that a pastoral visit can be arranged. Please contact the clergy to discuss arrangements for baptisms, weddings, or burials **before** any announcement or other plans are made.

Outreach

Food may be deposited in the basket at the entrance of the church to aid the neighborhood ministry to the poor through Crossroads and Georgia Street Community Co-on.

Dedicated donations for the support of the *Malawi Education Fund* and *Rector's Discretionary Fund* can be put in the collection plate with a note in the memo line or on the envelope.

Collections of school supplies, cleaning supplies, garden tools, Christmas presents, mittens, sweaters, etc. occur throughout the year to support our community.

St. John's Teaching Notes

What are we doing this morning? Morning Prayer and Communion

One of the glorious achievements of Archbishop Thomas Cranmer in compiling the Book of Common Prayer was the development of the Daily Offices of Morning and Evening Prayer. Other than those in the convents and monasteries, there were few who had the time to pray all seven Monastic Offices, not to mention being able to understand the complicated instructions. In combining all the Offices into Morning Prayer and Evening Prayer, Cranmer made accessible the ability for all to pray the Offices of the Church.

The original rubrics for Sunday Morning Worship in the Church of England was for Morning Prayer (which was to be prayed every day anyway), the Litany, AND Holy Communion. In the next 450 years the practices of the Church have changed back and forth. One phenomena that occurred was the saying of just Morning Prayer, or Morning Prayer with Litany alone, which originally was only permissible to parishes without a priest to celebrate the Holy Communion regularly. In some places this practice spread to parishes with full-time clergy as well. Although most Anglican parishes and dioceses around the world never deviated from the traditional practice of Communion every Sunday, others did, and most have recently reclaimed that heritage.

Archbishop Michael Ramsey, the 100th Archbishop of Canterbury (1961–1974) recommended the combination of Morning Prayer and Holy Communion to those parishes desiring to preserve the Morning Prayer tradition, while being obedient to the apostolic tradition of receiving Communion every Sunday.

This morning's service is that combination. We will be doing Morning Prayer as the "antecommunion", which is the technical name for the portion of the Holy Communion service from the opening Collect for Purity through the Confession, Absolution, and Comfortable Words. We will then continue the Holy Communion Service from the Sursum corda ("Lift up your hearts") through the end. Although it may make the service a few minutes longer, it is a good way to both honor the morning prayer tradition, as well as being able to receive Communion EVERY Sunday.

Bless the founders and benefactors of this parish, and recompense them with the riches of Thine everlasting kingdom, for Jesus Christ's sake. Amen.
