Rector's Rambling

As August comes to a close, we look back at a month full of fun and wonderful 'extras', in-

cluding two wedding anniversary celebrations, two baptisms, and a guest celebrant and preacher who grew up at St. John's but until this past month hadn't had the opportunity to say Mass at our altar where his vocation to the priesthood was awakened under the tutelage of Fr. Thomas Frisby. Each of these occasions brought many guests to worship with us at a time when many of us were away on vacation and attendance is usually at its lowest for the year.

St. John's is in a prominent location. We are easily recognized in reference - "the corner of Woodward and I-75 next to Comerica Park and across from Hockeytown Café". We are very recognizable to those who come downtown or drive by on the freeway. They know the building, but are less likely to know the name of the Church since they glance at us in passing as they head to the ballpark, stadium, arena, or theatres.

One of the projects the vestry has been working on this spring and summer has been to improve the signage, to put a


name in people's heads when we are refered in conversation.

We now have our two halo-backlit \$1.

John's installed on the Burton Ministry

Center. This is a remarkable addition! People walking or driving on Montcalm Avenue to the south cannot miss the name of the church. The north side sign is visible from the freeway and the housing on the other side.

The updated historic sign in the front of the Church has been installed and a replacement John's Chap entrance sign has ar rived and will installed shortly.



There are three more signage upgrades to come soon. On the Fisher Freeway Service Drive side, a sign will be installed with the name and our service times for those walking toward the stadium or from the arena toward parking. Over the tower door will be another St. John's sign prominently visible for those on the Service Drive or walking on Woodward. The large electronic pedestal sign will be removed for 2 weeks, repainted, and re-installed with an upgraded electronic screen.

Of course, the most important part of a visibility project is getting the parishioners to share their love for St. John's with friends, family, and strangers. Folks will know the building and will know the name - your invitation may be how our Lord is bringing them into His fold.

Communion Procedure

The Episcopal House of Bishops, in a 1979 teaching, lays out the following guideline for non-Episcopalians to receive communion in an Episcopal Church: The persons should 1) have been Baptized with water in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, 2) believe Christ is present in the sacrament, 3) have been admitted to Holy Communion in their own denomination, and 4) are attempting, by God's grace, to live in love and charity with their neighbor. If you have any questions, please speak to the priest.

To receive the Host, raise your crossed hands, right palm over left. You may also receive directly on the tongue. If you do not wish to receive the Cup, cross your arms over your chest and wait for the chalice bearer to

pass by.

If you are not receiving communion, you still may come forward to the rail, cross your arms over your chest,

and receive a blessing.

If you are physically unable to approach the rail, please inform an usher and the Sacrament will be brought to you.

Pastoral Care

Please inform the clergy if you or a family member are ill, hospitalized, or unable to attend the regular worship of the Church so that a pastoral visit can be Please contact the clergy to discuss arrangements for baptisms, weddings, or burials before any announcement or other plans are made.

Outreach

Every Sunday: Food or clothing may be deposited in the basket at the entrance of the church to aid the neighborhood ministry to the poor through Crossroads.

First Sunday of the month: The loose offerings collected are given to support the mission work of the Church in Malawi, Central Africa. Please add a cash gift or extra check in the collection plate every first Sunday of the month!

St. John's Teaching Notes Labor Day

Come Labor on! Who dare stand idle, on the harvest plain; while all around us wave the golden grain? And to each servant does the Master say, "Go work today." ~ Hymn 576

This weekend Summer makes its last "hurrah" as we celebrate the Labor Day weekend. There are plenty of things to do this weekend as we bring summer to an unofficial close. On Tuesday school begins and society gets back into its fall/winter/ spring routine.

Of course, all of the above activities, as fun as they may be, have nothing to do with the holiday itself. According to the U.S. Department of Labor, "Labor Day, the first Monday in September, is a creation of the labor movement and is dedicated to the social and economic achievements of American workers. It constitutes a yearly national tribute to the contributions workers have made to the strength, prosperity, and well-being country." (www.DoL.gov) And, in fact, many labor unions will hold rallies this weekend to celebrate the American worker, the unions themselves, and their various causes. This grand old stone edifice on the corner of Woodward and Fisher Freeway has seen many a labor parade and rally pass by its doors.

Labor unions have evolved over the years, and our economy has certainly changed in the last 125 Membership in unions has declined as employment in manufacturing and other "labor intensive" industries has automated or moved away.

As we celebrate Labor Day this year, let us remember in our prayers that our common good is dependent upon each other. The creation and sustaining of gainful employment is a recognition of each other's basic humanity and dignity. As the Department of Labor says, "The vital force of labor added materially to the highest standard of living and the greatest production the world has ever known and has brought us closer to the realization of our traditional ideals of economic and political democracy. It is appropriate, therefore, that the nation pay tribute on Labor Day to the creator of so much of the nation's strength, freedom, and leadership – the American worker."
