Rector's Rambling




August and early September are usually "down time" at churches. Hot weather, people away on

There is also an elevator in the building which provides access to the undercroft, so everyone may fully participate in activities and fellowship.

We would be very pleased if you plan to return to St. John's on a regular basis, to **WORSHIP** as part of our parish family. Please complete a Visitor's Form located in the Order of Service and place it in the collection plate or give it to an usher.

Thank you for coming! We look forward to greeting you following the service today and hope to chat with you during our time of fellowship in the undercroft.

Pastoral Care

Please inform the clergy if you or a family member are ill, hospitalized, or unable to attend the regular worship of the Church so that a pastoral visit can be arranged. Please contact the clergy to discuss arrangements for baptisms, weddings, or burials **before** any announcement or other plans are made.

Outreach

Food may be deposited in the basket at the entrance of the church to aid the neighborhood ministry to the poor through Crossroads and Georgia Street Community Co-op.

Dedicated donations for the support of the *Malawi Education Fund* and *Rector's Discretionary Fund* can be put in the collection plate with a note in the memo line or on the envelope.

Collections of school supplies, cleaning supplies, garden tools, Christmas presents, mittens, sweaters, etc. occur throughout the year to support our community.

The Outreach Committee begins meeting in January to solicit applications for grants from St. John's. Local community 501c3 organizations are encouraged to apply for funding to help with their good work in the community. Past grant recipients have included work in addressing food insecurity, jail ministry, human trafficking, homelessness, illiteracy, beds for foster children, horse-related therapy, and community gardening.

Committee members visit the applicants and their ministries, and make a recommendation to the Vestry to award the grants, which occurs in late spring.

Additionally, we invite the grant recipients to include us when they need help with projects, or need a building or commercial kitchen, for their activities.


Other community groups, such as local homeowners associations and 12 step recovery addiction recovery groups use our buildings for meetings and gatherings. We are grateful to be able to help.

Capital Improvements

Our 165 year old buildings are constantly in need of maintenance and upkeep, so that we can continue to use them to glorify God.

As mentioned on the front page of this Eagle, our major signage upgrade is underway, including the new historic marker, and several **St. Julin's** signs on the Burton Ministry Center and the tower door. The large electronic signboard will be restored with new a new electronic panel upgrade as well.

Another project underway is some repairs to the slate roof. The last major roofing job was in 2001 with several spot-repairs over the years. This one will address some spots were leaking is occurring and were slates are missing.

The next major project on the horizon, most likely early 2026, will be a major upgrade to the electrical system, followed by lighting upgrades. Some of the wiring in the church dates to 1937 when the church was moved 60 feet to widen Woodward. Some of this wiring is cloth covered! And some of the fuse boxes date to that year as well.

Once the electrical system is upgraded we can tackle the interior lighting, upgrading its brightness and coverage. Also, the exterior lighting installed in the 1990s is in need of upgrade, particularly on the freeway side of the building. Exterior lighting helps us to continue to be a light set on a hill that cannot be hid! More details to come soon.

THE DAILY OFFICE MORNING AND EVENING PRAYER

One of the glories of Anglicanism is the Daily Offices of Morning and Evening Prayer. When the first English Prayer Book was published (1549) it included the form for Morning and Evening Prayer so that not only the clergy could pray it, but so were those who are members of the congregation. The previous expectation was that the Daily Office was to be prayed by the clergy and monks/nuns, in latin with instructions that could be intimidating.

The 1928 Book of Common Prayer continues the Prayer Book formulary of the Daily Offices. But even in this form finding the proper reading assigned for the day depends on knowing what week of the liturgical year we are currently doing. This is one of the reasons we republish the lectionary for each week in this publication (page 3). Morning and Evening Prayer requires a prayer book and bible, and takes about 15 to 20 minutes prayed alone.

There are also what is known as the minor office, 5 minute moments of prayer which can prayed throughout the day in addition to Morning and Evening Prayer. They are not in the regular Book of Common Prayer, but available in supplemental texts.

One of those supplemental



books is called The Anglican Office Book. The printed version, available

At https:// store.standrewsalmanor.org/ collections/books This includes the Daily Offices of Morning and Evening Prayer, the Authorized (King James) Version of the Bible, and the minor Offices, also known as The Hours, of Prime, Terce, Sext, None, and Compline.

Additionally, they now have free website www.anglicanoffice.com where it automatically knows what day it is, loading up Morning and Evening Prayer for that day with all the appointed psalms and readings for that day. Just start at the top and pray - no need to go flip back and forth between the office, psalm, and bible readings. And at the top right corner you can click on the Hours tab and get the minor office for that time. It is a very convenient way to pray using your laptop or phone.
