Notes on Selected Portions of Today's Music

The Sermon Hymn:

O Holy Spirit, God was written by Percy Dearmer for Songs of Praise, 1931, in order to provide a hymn on the Holy Spirit which children could sing, and which should touch on other aspects of the working of the Eternal Spirit, as well as those enumerated in the Whitsuntide hymns.

Venice was composed by William Amps, and first published in Thorne's *Selection of Psalm and Hymn Tunes*, 1858 (1859 ed.). Notice the canonic imitation of soprano and alto in the second phrase of the tenor and bass parts.

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The Recessional Hymn:

Based on Habakkuk 2:14, "For the earth shall be filled with the knowledge of the glory of the Lord, as the waters cover the sea," this was written by Arthur Campbell Ainger in 1894 and dedicated to Edward White Benson. It was first published, with a tune by Millicent D. Kingham called *Benson*, in leaflet form. It entered the *Hymnal* in 1916.

Purpose was composed by Martin Shaw for this text in the enlarged edition of Songs of Praise, 1931.
