#### **Notes on Selected Portions of Today's Music**

#### The Offertory Anthem:

"Music has been my chief delight," Healey Willan (1880–1968) once said, "and if at any time I have been able to share this delight with others, I am content." During the course of a career of more than eighty years, Willan did indeed share his love of music with countless performers, parishioners, students and other lovers of music. Often referred to as the "dean of Canadian composers", he wrote more than 700 works, including symphonies, operas, a concerto, chamber music, pieces for piano, orchestra and band – as well as a wealth of music for the church.

Behold, the tabernacle of God (HWC 318) is a well-known and highly mystical motet. From its striking opening in G minor with a Phrygian A flat and a false relation of E natural and E flat, to its chromatic migration to A flat minor at "for the love of whom ye do this day", and its climax on B flat major at "a season of festivity", it shows Willan to be a master of his technique. He is expert at finding his most appropriate music to express the words. Swirling clouds of incense are suggested at the word "holy", and echoed at "gate". The word "dreadful" in the phrase "O how dreadful is this place" has the obsolete meaning of "full of awe". Intended for the Feast of Dedication, Behold, the tabernacle of God is Liturgical Motet no. 9. It was composed in June 1933 for the 100th anniversary of the Church of St. James, Chicago, and dedicated to its organist, the American composer Leo Sowerby.

#### The Closing Hymn:

It is claimed by some writers that Sir John Bowring had visited Macao, on the South Chinese coast, and was much impressed by the sight of a bronze cross towering on the summit of the massive wall of what had formerly been a great cathedral. This cathedral, originally built by the early Portuguese colonists, overlooked the harbor and had been destroyed by a typhoon and left crumbled in its wake-except for one wall topped by the huge metal cross. This scene is said to have so impressed Bowring that it eventually served as the inspiration for this beloved hymn.

John Bowring was born at Exeter in Devon, England, on October 17, 1792. He was considered to be one of the most remarkable men of his day as well as one of the greatest linguists who ever lived. He was a member of nearly every learned society in Europe. Before he was sixteen years of age he had mastered five languages without the aid of a teacher. It is said that he could converse in over 100 different languages before his death. He also did much in translating literary works from these various languages. Throughout his life he was noted as a biographer, naturalist, financier, statesman and philanthropist. He served two terms in the House of Commons and in 1854 was appointed governor of Hong Kong. This same year he was knighted by Queen Victoria for outstanding service to his country. He was a prolific writer on the subjects of politics, economics, and religion as well as the author of many poems and hymns, including the rather familiar missionary hymn, Watchman, tell us of the night [#440]. Yet despite his many accomplishments, including thirty-six volumes of published works, John Bowring is known today primarily as the author of this simply stated hymn text. On his tombstone are inscribed the words of this hymn, In the cross of Christ I glory.
