#### **Notes on Selected Portions of Today's Music**

#### **The Offertory Anthem:**

Richard Dering (c. 1580–1630) was an English Catholic musician who went into exile in the Spanish Netherlands (or, according to another account, converted to Catholicism while visiting Rome in 1612). By 1617 he was organist to the convent of English nuns in Brussels, and in the same year published his first collection of *Cantiones Sacrae*; the publisher was the noted Phalèse of Antwerp. *Factum est silentium* comes from a second collection which appeared in 1618; its declamatory, dramatic style shows clearly the influence of the new Italian Baroque style which Dering's compatriots in England were perhaps slower to embrace.
