Notes on Selected Portions of Today's Music

The Offertory Anthem:

John Joubert (b. 1927) received his early musical education in Cape Town, and in 1946 was awarded a Performing Right Society Scholarship to the Royal Academy of Music, London. In 1950 he was appointed to a lectureship in music at the University of Hull. Since 1962 Joubert has lived in Birmingham, where he held the post of reader in music at the University. In 1979 he was visiting professor at the University of Otago, New Zealand. He decided in 1986 upon early retirement in order to devote more time to composition. Durham conferred upon him the degree of DMus Honoris Causa in 1991, and he accepted an appointment as Senior Research Fellow at Birmingham in 1997. A very distinguished academic teaching career has not, however, precluded his gradual emergence as one of this country's most significant 'establishment' composers. Important commissions include works for the Three Choirs and Birmingham Triennial Festivals, the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra, the Royal Philharmonic Society and the BBC. He was Composer in Residence at the Peterborough Cathedral Festival in 1990, and at the Presteigne Festival in 1997.

His carol *Torches* (Op. 7a, 1951) (written for his wife Mary's pupils and based on a Galician carol, it was published in 1961 in the first volume of *Carols for Choirs*) and the anthem *O Lorde, the Maker of Al Thing* (Op. 7b, 1952) (which won the 1952 Novello Anthem Competition), achieved almost instant popularity. Concerning *Torches*, Joubert recalled, "I've even had carol-singers come to the door and sing it, without knowing the composer lives inside."
