

If you are new, please be sure to fill out a visitor card and place it in an offertory plate, and/or sign one of the guest registers in the narthex at the back of the church. Whether you are new, or returning from a time away, we are glad you are here and hope that you will join us for fellowship and refreshments in the undercroft below the nave (general seating area) of the church. To reach the undercroft, you may take either the stairway in the southwest corner of the narthex, or, should you desire the use of an elevator, you may use the one located at the east end of the building. To get to the elevator, just travel up the aisle on the Gospel (north/left) side of the nave, through the hallway past the chapel to the elevator. Press "1" to reach the floor below and then, once there, simply take a left out of the elevator, and head down the hallway into the undercroft. Notes on Selected Portions of Today's Music

The Offertory Anthem:

Orlando Gibbons (1583–1625) is acknowledged as one of the foremost composers of his period; he wrote some 40 anthems, a variety of other church music, a book of madrigals, and a large quantity of keyboard and instrumental consort music. He was born in Oxford of a musical family, and sang as a boy in the choir of King's College, Cambridge, where later, in 1599, he became a student. In about 1603 he moved to London to become a Gentleman of the Chapel Royal. By the time of his death he was senior organist there, and also organist of Westminster Abbey.

This edition of Almighty and everlasting God is primarily based upon the version printed by John Barnard in First Book of Selected Church Musick (1641). The anthem seems to have been especially popular during the latter half of the seventeenth century; parts and scores dating from 1660 onwards are to be found at Gloucester Cathedral, the British Library, St. Paul's Cathedral, St. Michael's College Tenbury, St. George's Chapel Windsor, and at York Minster.
